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
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ABOUT **US**

MISSION

Asamblea de Cooperación por la Paz is a secular, non-profit NGO independent of any political affiliation. It defends democratic values from a social and economic justice viewpoint and has been firmly committed to pacifism, tolerance and dialogue from its beginnings in 1990.

We support democratic, progressive civil society in developing countries by generating local organisation, fostering citizen participation and seeking alternatives to achieve fairer and more democratic societies in which the benefits of development are more equitably distributed, enabling local agents to play the central role.

In the educational field, Asamblea de Cooperación por la Paz is undertaking work and studies aimed at supporting and developing peace education and awareness-raising activities.

Our goals include fostering tolerance, solidarity, and interculturality while combating racism and xenophobia so that our society can take an active role in defending human rights.

VISION

We champion peace, democratic reform processes and the pursuit of dialogue, helping to raise domestic and international public awareness to ensure that conflict-prevention measures are implemented and international organisations step in on the basis of legitimate humanitarian intervention when required to defend fundamental human rights.

AND VALUES

And on the other, Peace. From its very beginnings as an outcome of the pacifist demonstrations against the first Gulf war, ACPP's activity has been marked by a desire for peace and the conviction that the use of violence can only be justified as a last resort to prevent genocide and/or collective violations of basic human rights.

Besides these two core values, ACPP also focuses its actions on equity in the distribution of resources, progressive political orientation aimed at sustainable and environmentallyfriendly development, the fight against poverty and working for gender equality.

In our efforts to change North-South relations, we are committed to working on both sides of the equation and champion the values of tolerance, coexistence, interculturality and solidarity through our Social Action and Development Education projects.

Renewing commitment on a daily basis is the best way to sustain hope

Once again, it is time to take stock of the extensive and varied work carried out by Asamblea de Cooperación por la Paz over the last reporting period. And, once again, we cannot avoid mentioning the disturbing contexts in which we have carried it out.

All the territories and countries in which we operate have been impacted by **numerous outbreaks of violence.** These events darken the horizon of hope and point to the birth of a radically different world from the one we knew, and it is already here.

We have been living and working for several years in a situation of *polycrisis* which, far from improving, has only worsened. In the past twelve months we have seen an alarming world-wide escalation of **armed conflicts** in some cases reaching unprecedented levels of brutality, driving or driven a voracious militarism.

We are witnessing the **discredit** of an **international framework** originally built to ensure peaceful coexistence on the planet but which has now lost credibility in the eyes of a large part of the world's inhabitants, who look on in disbelief at its uselessness, its ineffectiveness, and the double standards

it applies. **Democracies** around the world are weakening under attack from extremist positions in a polarized world in which misinformation, disaffection from politics and trivialisation of the ideas and values that have sustained our society for decades are leaving us bereft of reference points. We have continued to suffer the consequences of a climate emergency for which the necessary and urgent measures are not being taken, and we have stood by and watched as millions of people have had to leave their homes to flee natural and man-made disasters. It is clear that the system itself is suffering a global crisis, and at the moment there seems to be no alternative.

Once again, these **multifarious faces of violence**, in spite of their global impact, affect the impoverished countries of the Global South and people marginalised by the system in an especially brutal manner.

In this context, the only thing that gives us hope is the conviction that our daily work is meaningful, that the ongoing collective struggle changes things, that every day impacts the lives of the people and communities with whom we work.

Only a few of the numerous day-to-day efforts that we have undertaken and accomplished can be mentioned here.

Although we will devote specific time to this issue at the General Assembly, it is inevitable to begin this report by focusing on **Palestine**, a territory closely linked to the origins of our organisation. And we must begin by paying tribute to the local organisations with which we have been working for so many years and to the efforts of all our colleagues who form part of them and who have risen every morning, amidst the inhuman tragedy in which they and their people are immersed, to keep on working with unflagging determination and commitment.

Since Hamas' horrific attack against the Israeli civilian population - which ACPP condemned immediately- the State of Israel has continued to escalate the degree of violence and brutality in the Gaza Strip to unbearable, turning it into a human graveyard reduced to rubble, an uninhabitable wasteland where a self-proclaimed democratic state is using starvation as a weapon of mass destruction against an exhausted population. At the same time, the occupation is advancing in the West Bank with a serious increase in harassment by Israeli settlers and the army itself, forced displacement, arbitrary arrests, growing restrictions on movement and the destruction of basic services. Whichever way you look at it there is not the slightest doubt that the Israeli Government is waging a genocidal colonial war against the civilian population on a daily basis, with flagrant violation of human rights and international humanitarian law. Meanwhile, Western leaders have not had the courage to condemn the perpetrators with the firmness and unanimity the events require or to force an immediate ceasefire. However, certain countries are taking steps that will hopefully mark the beginning of the end of the "exceptional status" that Israel has enjoyed in its international relations despite the Palestinian issue and its apartheid policy.

The case brought by South Africa before the International Court of Justice to have Israel investigated for genocide with the explicit support of Spain, or Spain's recognition of the Palestinian State –with which, along with Ireland and Norway, it joins the 142 countries that had already done so– are necessary but insufficient political measures. We will have to wait and see if Joseph Biden's plan for

a ceasefire in Gaza materialises and if the conference that Spain is promoting contributes to achieve peace.

During this time, ACPP has continued to work alongside our local partners to keep the projects that support the Palestinian resistance on the West Bank alive and to deliver aid to the population of Gaza, initially to those caught by surprise on the West Bank and, as the weeks went by, to those trapped in the Gaza Strip. We have received support from private donors, institutions, schools, associations and other groups that have organised fundraising events throughout our Emergencia Gaza campaign, and we have been able to distribute fresh food, hot meals, water, warm clothing, latrines in refugee camps and cash transfers through our partner organisations in the Gaza Strip using a tool created for this purpose.

As members of the Palestinian NGDO umbrella group we have also engaged in an intense political advocacy campaign in Spain from the very beginning of the conflict. All parties involved have worked extremely hard to build an internal consensus, managing to put their nuanced political differences aside, achieving approval of a non-binding motion in the Spanish Congress. The motion demands a negotiated solution that leads to a peace process, an immediate and permanent ceasefire, sufficient and sustained humanitarian access to occupied Palestinian territory -especially the Gaza Strip-, respect for international humanitarian law and human rights and an end to arms trade with Israel. We also form part of the nation-wide Libertad para Palestina platform, created in recent months with the participation of class-based unions, political parties and social movements. We have already organised several advocacy and awareness-raising events with this platform.

Finally, I would like to mention the extreme difficulties that ACPP and all the international organisations present on the ground are encountering to maintain our presence there.

Israel's visa ban that directly affects our personnel is a cause of great concern and uncertainty about how we will be able to continue our operations in Palestine. Our presence is seriously endangered, especially in view of the latest political gestures from the Government of Spain.

But violence is not exercised exclusively through its maximum expression, war. Xenophobia, fuelled by political structures in the Dominican Republic and Tunisia, restrictions on the exercise of first- and second-generation rights and on the achievements of the feminist movement in El Salvador, or the risk of setbacks in gender equality in Senegal in the context of demands for national sovereignty and indigenous cultural values, the continual overcrowding of refugee camps due to climate change or neighbouring armed conflicts in Niger, the rise of hate speech and of reactionary scenarios in Europe... These are just a few of the numerous manifestations of violence perpetrated against the peoples of the countries where we work with our local partners.

Over the past twelve months we have continued to identify and launch projects in all these contexts with day-to-day commitment to support the struggles of groups that suffer from these and similar conditions, seeking together ways to address their causes, methods to defend their rights against hostile and repressive governments, and means to manage care.

Not to mention taking care of ourselves. International organisations are being singled out as unwanted, inconvenient and disruptive foreign agents in more and more contexts. The case of Israel, in fact, is by no means unique. As we have reported elsewhere, the Government of El **Salvador** is increasing the pressure to restrict freedom of movement not only of Salvadoran organisations but also of international bodies that channel solidarity funds to support the formers' work. Along the same lines, the Tunisian Government has begun to apply the law restrictively with the aim of drastically reducing the presence of international NGDOs in the country and criminalising all domestic and international organisations that, like us, work with undocumented migrants, threatening to shut down and expel us.

And all this is occurring without the slightest response from the European Union. Furthermore, the recently-approved European Pact on Migration and Asylum legalises the most serious violations against migrants and their fundamental rights in European territory, and implicitly enables the European Union to avoid holding the

perpetrators of these violations accountable in third countries to which it externalises borders. Consequently, in recent months we have also been busy reviewing our field security plans and organising an internal working group focused on the protection of human rights defenders (natural and legal persons) and self-protection. This group will be responsible for ensuring appropriate training and for analysing protection schemes in contexts that could require them. Unfortunately, it seems that these aspects are going to be one of ACPP's central concerns in the immediate future.

The recent European elections have only confirmed what we already knew: the advance of reactionary forces in Europe seems **unstoppable.** The far right is currently the leading political force in France and Italy, the second in Germany and the third in Spain. In the autonomous regions cogoverned by the extreme right, we are seeing -among other signs of reactionary activity- a rapid deterioration of public education and healthcare, enactment of cleanslate laws, criminalisation of dissent from heteronormative and patriarchal sectors, the rise of political violence and hate speech and deterioration of coexistence and peace.

Consequently, in recent times we have taken significant steps in the of communication with a clear combating hate speech. The Cómplices campaign represents one of these steps. This campaign has evolved over the last few months, complementing the digital tool from which it started, fostering guerrilla communication schemes and awarenessraising measures. It is specifically designed to catch the attention of young people and to learn about and analyse their activism and militancy activity. This is an essential approach if we want to understand and counteract the dramatic disinformation and highly alarming influence to which they are subjected on the social media. At the same time, we must also continue to be an active, up-to-date organisation and to ensure generational renewal and recycling of our social base, just one more task on our long homework list!

We are also exploring innovative methods that return the concept of peace to the centre of our interventions in the areas of education and social intervention.

Thus, we continue to train our personnel in peace-building and culture-based methods such as restorative practices and continue to foster peace-making and conflict resolution processes in public schools. Peace –understood as the result of peaceful, fair and inclusive societies that are free from fear and violence– is one of the five pillars of the 2030 Agenda. Hence, we have developed projects aimed at reducing all forms of violence and/or discrimination (racial, cultural, gender-based, etc.) including hate speech and bullying.

However, this work, which defines us as educational agents and is of vital importance, continues to encounter obstacles in its path. To an ever-increasing degree the Spanish Official Development Assistance (ODA) institutions are neglecting the pursuit of critical thinking and the values of a culture of peace in the field of Global Citizenship Education, causing us serious problems to obtain funding for our educational projects through conventional Education for Development calls.

While the acceleration of democratic decline is becoming more and more evident worldwide, one of the tools that can most effectively counteract it -the cooperation policy of donor countries led by the European Union and its Member States - is stagnating. What should be a strong commitment to a solid and supportive cooperation policy capable of transforming causes while reducing people's suffering, has become a geostrategic instrument serving other interests, a situation that undermines Europe's credibility worldwide. They are supporting fewer and fewer NGDOs, taking an increasingly business-oriented and market-based approach. This model fosters outsourcing, depoliticisation of local civil society and impoverishment of the diversity of Europe's social fabric.

Preliminary data from the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) for 2023 indicate that **funding is increasing, although at the expense of support for Ukraine,** which far exceeds the funding allocated to the entire Sub-Saharan Africa or to all other humanitarian action. The state coordinator (La Coordinadora) also denounces the weakness and inadequacy of the Spanish cooperation contribution that remains steady at 0.24% of GNI, well below the budget commitment assumed to reach 0.34% in

2023. Spain is thus moving away from the average for DAC countries, which now reaches 0.37%. The situation is dramatic if we consider the evolution of the financing of Spanish decentralised cooperation in those institutions governed by the most conservative and reactionary parties that emerged after the elections a year ago. All this is in stark contrast to the growing civic commitment of the population to international solidarity.

In view of this scenario, ACPP has taken an active part in the **political advocacy** fostered by La Coordinadora, although the results for 2024 have been limited due, among other reasons, to a continuing resolution that extends the previous year's budget. We have also been a key player in the advocacy work conducted in many of the Spanish autonomous regions, with important successes in cases such as Andalusia, where it was able to stop the Andalusian Government's intention to cut the 2024 budget for the time being. The internal **working group** created to coordinate our work in the coordinating bodies has done a good job in supporting these processes.

According to La Coordinadora's 2023 Sector Report, taking the income that we obtained during said year into account, ACPP is one of the top fifteen Spanish NGDOs. Despite the enormous difficulties we have faced and the decline in funding for NGDOs we have achieved excellent results at the end of the year, once more increasing both our funding -and consequently that of our local partnersand the scale of the projects we carry out. Notwithstanding the above, our forecasts indicate that support for our projects from conventional financing channels will be significantly reduced in coming years, precisely because of these difficulties and general regression, and we are preparing for this scenario.

We will devote a specific item on the agenda of our next General Assembly to providing an in-depth analysis of these data and perspectives. Finally, we must not forget to mention the fact that we have also been taking care of internal processes, working on *identity* definition and internal reinforcement. This process has promoted dialogue and strategic analysis among the organisation's management while launching a series of working groups and fostering assessment, lesson learning and socialisation

processes. Likewise, this process is bringing our funding model into focus, along with our need to implement sustainability measures in our relationships with partners and to pursuit our usefulness and added value as a social and political movement in the current context.

All these reflections will be extremely useful for the collective construction of the new Strategic Framework of Asamblea de Cooperación por la Paz in the coming years. Driven by feminism and necessarily focused on the redistribution of power and wealth, this framework will posit Social and


Solidarity Economy as a viable alternative to an economic system that is unsupportive and aggressive towards people and the Planet. Social and technological innovation will be one of the cross-cutting instruments of our transformative activity and communication will be our best tool for connecting with our social base and society in general. A new strategic framework will be born in which PEACE will be the umbrella that encompasses and explains everything we do, the only possible antidote to all expressions of violence.




AMOUNT GRANTED BY GEOGRAPHICAL AREA


NUMBER OF PROJECTS APPROVED BY SECTOR








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
NUMBER OF PROJECTS APPROVED BY SECTORS

To the Board of Directors and Members of ASAMBLEA DE COOPERACIÓN POR LA PAZ:

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of ASAMBLEA DE COOPERACIÓN POR LA PAZ comprised of the balance sheet as at 31 December 2023, the income statement, the cash flow statement and the notes for the financial year ended on said date.


In our opinion, the attached financial statements provide, in all material respects, a true and faithful image of the assets and financial position of the Association as at 31 December 2023 and of the cash flow and balance and of the financial year ended on said date in accordance with the applicable financial reporting regulatory framework (identified in note 2 to the financial statements) and, in particular, with the accounting principles and criteria contained therein.

Grounds of the opinion

We have conducted our audit in accordance with the currently-applicable accounting rules issued by the regulatory authorities for audits in Spain. Our responsibilities under these rules are set forth in more detail in the Auditor's Responsibilities when Auditing Financial Statements section of this report.

We are a separate entity from the Association in accordance with the ethical and independence requirements applicable to our audit of financial statements in Spain, as required by the regulations governing auditing of financial statements. Furthermore, we have not provided services other than auditing financial statements, nor have we been involved in situations or circumstances which, in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid regulatory dispositions, could have compromised the required independence.

We believe that the accounting evidence we have obtained provides a sufficient and appropriate basis for our opinion.





Key aspects of the audit

The key aspects of the audit are those which, according to our professional judgement, constitute the most significant risks of material misstatement in our audit of the financial statements for the current period. We have addressed these risks as a whole in the context of our audit of the financial statements in order to form an opinion of the latter, and we do not express a separate opinion on said risks.

In our judgement, the following issue is the most important aspect of the audit and should be emphasised in our report.

- Analysis of the sources and destinations of financial resources obtained by the Association during the financial year

In view of the nature of the Association and the activities it has performed during the financial year, the aim of which is to obtain resources for the fulfilment of the purposes defined in its articles of association, we consider it necessary to verify the application of the resources obtained during the financial year under study.

Our work has consisted of the following tasks:

- Analysis and verification of the origin of the funds -primarily in the form of subsidies- received by the Association by means of development of substantive evidence.
- Review and verification of the Association's analytical accounting as set forth for each project executed and developed in accordance with the aforesaid activity.
- Obtaining supporting documentation for the subsidies obtained.
- Verification of proper compliance with the principles of revenue and expense matching and of accrual, in accordance with the progress made in the execution of each of the projects awarded.
- Verification of proper documentation and supporting evidence for expenses associated with each of the projects under analysis.
- Third-party reconciliation.
- Validation of the information contained in the Activity Report (together with its Annexes) attached to the Financial Statements.
- Verification of the adequacy of the information included in the notes to the Financial Statements.

Further information: Management Report

Further information consists exclusively of the Management Report for the 2023 financial year.

In accordance with its nature and all the information contained in the Financial Statements, the Association does not need to draw up a management report since –according to the applicable regulations for non-profit entities– the function of said report is covered by the section of the notes explaining the activity of the entity. The Association draws up its Financial Statements in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of the Interior, and the Management Report does not form part of the reporting documentation required from Associations in the Public Interest.



Responsibility of directors in relation to the Financial Statements

The Board of Directors of the Association is responsible for preparing the attached Financial Statements and ensure that they reflect a true and fair view of the assets, financial position and results of the organisation in accordance with the regulatory framework for financial information applicable to ASAMBLEA DE COOPERACIÓN POR LA PAZ in Spain. It is also responsible for implementing the internal control system it deems necessary to ensure that the preparation of the financial statements is free from material misstatement due to fraud or error.


The Board of Directors is responsible for assessing the Association's capacity to continue as a going concern, for disclosing matters related to the status of going concern and using accounting criteria consistent with the going concern assumption unless said Board intends to either liquidate/dissolve the organisation or cease operations or has no realistic alternative to doing so.




